

A FINE MESS!

Messy play can be the last thing adults feel like, but it makes an enormous contribution to a child's early language and literacy development.

nnounce 'messy play' and many adults begin to cringe as they think of all that muck and even worse, cleaning up. Messy play can be a highly demanding activity as it requires a great deal of adult supervision (and self-restraint) as we allow our children to make 'mess'. However, despite its chaotic appearance, messy play makes an enormous contribution to your child's early language and literacy development. It is a vital component to children's cognitive processes and developing creativity, and benefits all children's learning.

So, how does playing with gloop, mud pies or play dough lead to communication, language and literacy learning?

It's simple really... messy play acts as a precursor to developing language and literacy skills. It is like the building blocks or foundations for establishing communication and it prepares the hands and fingers for that all important pencil grip and pre-writing activities that are essential literate behaviours.

Messy play provides opportunities for children to speak, take turns and listen when using shared resources. Children use words, actions and gestures to communicate and the relaxed atmosphere of messy play activities encourage children's confidence. According to Duffy (2007), Messy "play provides meaningful opportunities for children to talk through activities, reflect and modify actions, negotiate plans and activities and to take turns in conversation".

Playing with gloop presents a number of fundamental skills that are critical to this development. The simple process of making marks with the material, forming shapes and letters in the substance and ascribing meaning to it all leads to understanding the symbolic nature of written language.

Fine motor skills such as hand-eye coordination and



pincer grip, which are vital skills needed for writing, are practised subconsciously while children play with the gloop. As children further their play, they may begin to tell stories about the gloop and enhance their narrative skills. Their vocabulary is also further developed as they use descriptors to express how the gloop feels and what is happening. Children who may not be familiar with the descriptive language, listen and absorb these words and thus further their own understanding of our language rich world. That's an awful lot of learning from just mixing cornflour and water!

Similar learning occurs when children engage in mud play. Yes, believe it or not, glorious mud is a fantastic, top quality, higher brain function activity that fosters children's language and literacy development and best yet, it's free from your backyard.

For example, when children are playing mud pies and make a birthday cake with candles they are not only demonstrating a greater understanding of our cultural practices, but also using symbolic representation to express their knowledge. Twigs, bark chips and grass form the role of candles or cake decorations. This meaning the 'making' is pivotal to children's understandings of context and language

behaviour. As they sing the birthday song, or share the 'cake' with others, they are communicating and building on their speech patterns. Some children may also count the number of candles which leads to the exploration of a variety of mathematical concepts and numeracy related themes. Who would've thought that mud play would be so valuable to their child's development?

Some common and fantastic messy play recipes frequently used by playgroups include slime, play dough, gloop, bubble mix and various types of paint – microwave puff paint, crystal salt goop paint, coloured ice cube paint and flavoured finger paint.

Make your own gloop

Gradually add two cups of water to a packet of cornflour (preferably in play tub or bucket) until it is smooth and runny enough to dribble off of your hands. You can add food colouring or glitter for fun.


Let the children play with the gloop and experiment with the consistency and texture of it. Play with plastic toys or animals in the gloop and/or little toy bugs and insects to hide in the liquid.













sitting at home with a young child and wishing you had another adult to talk to? Craving adult conversation and stimulation? Ready to look at something other than the four walls of your home?

The annual Playgroup SA Member Survey indicates that through attending Playgroup within their local community, parents and carers gain knowledge on what services are best suited to families, what kindergartens and schools are in the area and even what hairdressers provide child friendly services.

Playgroup also provides parents and carers with a designated time and space to interact, play and strengthen relationships with their children. This is done without the

pressure of being at home and watching your children paint, for example, worried it's going to get spread on the carpet or up the walls. It's a chance to run around playing Cowboys and Indians without worrying about the beeping washing machine, the phone constantly ringing or the unmade beds calling.

Playgroup is about quality time, time to share in your child's joy at feeling the wind in their hair as they race down the slippery dip, get their hands all sticky at the pasting table and delight in making friends with other children. And it often stimulates your child enough for them to require a rest when they arrive home too.

Are you new to an area also? Don't know a single person in your local community? Then heading along to your local Playgroup is a great way of meeting local families. It's a fantastic way to ease into life in your new community, breaking the isolation of being home alone without the support of family or friends and, more importantly, it's an opportunity to gain valuable knowledge on what services are available within your community.

Facing some tough behaviour issues at home with your toddler? Not sure what else to try in settling your infant to sleep? Struggling with a fussy eater? A Playgroup can be a source of great benefit for carers or parents. Playgroup parents will openly discuss the issues they have faced on their parenting journey and share tips, advice and support for dealing with the issues and phases. Who else is better for parents and carers to talk to than a network of peers who have experienced exactly what they are experiencing?

Playgroups are non-judgemental environments – perfect for making friends, connecting with others and gaining sound advice from peers. Most of all, Playgroup is fun!

hristmas is a Christian festival which celebrates the birth of Jesus. It has also become a special time for families and friends to get together to share cards and gifts, food, love and peace. Did you know that long ago, people would put money in boxes when they visited church? On the day after Christmas they would open the boxes and give the money to the poor, hence the term Boxing Day.

Useful tips!

Tip 1. Before introducing Christmas activities at Playgroup it is a good idea to chat with families about what they would like to do in terms of celebrating the season, songs and activities, to avoid offending anyone.

Tip 2. Using recycled materials for craft activities is cheap and easy.

Christmas decoration ideas to make at home or playgroup

When planning for Christmas art and craft experiences, it's easier to decide on a theme first. For example, Santa and Elves, Penguins, Stockings, Nativity, Christmas Trees, etc. Here are some easy Christmas decoration craft ideas:

- Paper Chains: Make paper chains with coloured paper to decorate the room or a tree outside.
- Paper plate wreath: Cut out the middle of a paper plate.
 Decorate the ring with either collage materials, paint and/or leaves.
- Cardboard Roll Angels: Cut a paper doily in half and stick to the back of the cardboard roll. Use a pipe cleaner as a halo and attach to the top. On the front of the angel draw a face with textas.
- Christmas Placemat: Decorate a piece of A4 card with old Christmas cards and laminate or cover in contact to use as a placemat.
- Christmas Bon Bons: Cover a cardboard roll in crepe paper and tie off one end with ribbon. Fill the bon bon with treats of your choice. Tie off the other end with ribbon. You can also buy crackers that go into the bon bon at craft shops if you want the 'bang' effect.
- Tree Decorations: Paint pinecones to use as tree decorations.
- Christmas Tree: Make a Christmas tree out of paper

plates. Paint/decorate the plates and display them on the wall in a tree shape. Alternatively, make little individual hanging Christmas trees using different sized paddle pop sticks.

Here's a list of Christmas gifts to make at Playgroup

- Make Christmas baskets to hold special treats. These could be in the shape of a tree, Father Christmas or just decorate a small box.
- Make your own Christmas cards or gift tags.
- Make Christmas stockings to hang up at home. Cut a stocking shape out of card and staple the edges together leaving the top open. Decorate the outside of your stocking.
- Make your own wrapping paper paint or print on a large piece of paper. You can wrap up your family's presents with your paper.
- Make Christmas bags or boxes by decorating paper bags or small cardboard boxes. Use them to put your gifts in for Christmas day.

Healthy party food ideas for Playgroup

Playgroup SA encourages playgroups to celebrate special occasions such as children's birthdays, end of term breakups and other significant days. While special food is one way to help celebrate it is not the only way for families to mark significant occasions. Some healthy food ideas to include at your Playgroup break up could include:

- Fruit (fruit salad, fruit kebabs, fruit jelly cups)
- Frozen yoghurt
- Scones or pikelets
- Mini quiches
- Fruit mince pies
- Christmas pudding

WATER PLAY FUN!

n the lead up to summer in the International Year of Water Cooperation, it's an ideal time to celebrate water and cool down at Playgroup.

Water play is an important activity for children at Playgroup, as it can foster physical, social-emotional, and cognitive development. It's also great fun and keeps young ones from overheating during those long summer days.

There are so many water activities that you can try at playgroup (or home), but this is our pick of the best:

Bathing the dolls

Wash the plastic dolls at Playgroup in an old baby bath. Have props such as towels, empty hand soap containers, face washers and even a rubber ducky.

Here is the sea

Place assorted sea creature figurines, shells and even some sand into a water trough. Children can explore ocean themes.

Coloured water experimentation

Add a few drops of food colouring to the water tray.

Add a few funnels, measuring cups, egg whisks and any other interesting containers/jugs. Add new colours if interest wanes.

Antarctica discovery

Freeze blocks of ice in old ice cream containers and add to a shallow water-lined tray. Add penguin, seal and whale figurines and discover what life might be like in Antarctica. Or use dinosaur figurines and play Ice Age.

Paint the fence

Place a small amount of water into child sized buckets and add paint brushes. Explain to the children that the fence/cubby/side of the building needs re-painting with the magic paint pots. They'll be busy for hours!

Children have a natural attraction to water and as such they must be vigilantly supervised at all times. Playgroup SA recommends that parents/carers remain close to children when they are playing around water. Use 'touch supervision' – this means having an adult within arm's length of each child.
