Super post office opens

by Melina Scarfo An Australia Post superstore wa officially opened last week in Mount Barker by MP Rebekha Sharkie.

The new post office is designed to make it easier and more convenient for customers accessing postal services and required an investment of over \$400,000.

The store features free 24/7 parcel lockers for PO Box holders, a dedicated online shopping zone and financial, identity and travel services

Australia Post State Manager Jaymie Zadow said that the store was being opened in response to Mount Barker residents' need for a more

convenient postal service.
"Online shopping in Australia continues to grow and the introduction of a superstore in Mount Barker provides shoppers with access to postal services six days a week, Jaymie said.
"We know Mount Barker locals

love shopping online, especially recreational goods, with music and outdoor purchases such as boating, camping and fishing items soaring over 25 per cent according to latest

Federal Member for Mayo Rebekha Sharkie said that she was pleased this store would be more accessible.

"It's good to see a layout that is more spacious and accessible for people with disabilities," she said

"Australia Post remains an important part of regional communities where digital access isn't as available or reliable as it is in metropolitan areas.

"It is a one-stop-shop for a wide range of services including bill paying, money transfers and passport applications.

'This is important for my electorate which, according to the latest census, has a much older demographic than

neighbouring seats.
"Our older citizens often prefer face-to-face retail exchanges

"It is also encouraging to see Australia Post committing to a superstore in Mount Barker which is one of the fastest growing regional centres in Australia."

The Mount Barker store joins over 70 superstores that have opened across the country and will contribute to the 50 superstores Australia Post have committed to opening in regional and rural areas by 2020. The new Mount Barker Post Office

is located at 11 Walker Street, Mount Barker and is open Monday to Friday from 9am-5pm and Saturday from

Thursdays at Onkaparinga Valley Residential Care have become about bridging the generational gap with young kids participating in a playgroup hosted by the residents of the aged care facility.

The playgroup is for kids aged 0-5

and occurs every Thursday morning with benefits for both the young and the young at heart.

Onkaparinga Valley Residential Care Lifestyle Coordinator Renee Wichmann said the playgroup initiative is still in early stages

"The intergenerational playgroup at Onkaparinga Valley Residential Care has been running for about five weeks now." Renee said.

"Already we are receiving some positive feedback from residents, parents and kids alike.
"This is the only intergenerational

playgroup in the Hills and we've had some families travel from quite a distance to be involved.

"We're generally having about 10 kids out to each session."

Renee said that she was determined to run an intergenerational playgroup after reading about the potential benefits for residents of the care

"I'd seen some other similar Id seen some other similar playgroups reported on in the media and thought it would be good to have one here." Renee said.
"There is also some really positive research showing the benefits of an

older generation interacting with young kids.
"I knew I wanted to give this a go

and found out that Playgroup SA would support the initiative.

"Playgroup SA have been able to provide some guidance as well

as helping out with promotion and coordination of the program, and they're there if I have any questions."

Renee said that the program was already having a positive impact. "Everyone who is involved seems

to be loving it," Renee said.
"Some of our residents are either too far away from their own family to see them or being in the residential

facility means that they don't see their family as often, so it is nice for them to have the contact with the kids.

"And for the young ones, they seem to enjoy coming along and getting involved with the activities.

"We have a welcome activity or ice-breaker that usually involves some music and singing and then the kids break into activity groups that participate in messy play, craft, playing with toys and reading stories "Lots of the parents get involved

with the activities as well and I think this shows the holistic approach of the group.

Kylie Grivell is a parent involved with the playgroup and has been taking her three year old son Mitchell to the Thursday morning sessions "We've been attending the

playgroup since it started," Kylie said. "Mitchell's great grandmother Audrey actually lives at Onkaparinga

Valley Residential Care and this has been a nice way for him to remain in contact with her. "He was quite shy at first but he

seems to be enjoying meeting the other residents too.
"I think the playgroup has provided

a really nice opportunity for him to engage with an older generation, hear new stories and learn about their

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close to her own grandmother and wanted Mitchell to have a similar experience.

"I grew up with my grandmother actually living in our house," Kylie

"I think that connection with an older generation is really important for young kids and helps build their understanding of the world. "This is a nice way for the kids and

their parents to meet new people and a really good way to connect the community."

Kylie said that Mitchell looks forward to going to the playgroup

"It is one of those mutually beneficial things," Kylie said.

"I know that the residents look forward to the kids visiting but Mitchell is also really enjoying going along on a Thursday morning.
"He loves the really messy activities

with slime and paint and things that he wouldn't normally be allowed to play with at home

"At the start of playgroup all of the residents are usually sitting in a circle for when the kids arrive and I think Mitchell also loves the opportunity to show off for an audience.

"And it is really lovely to see the smiles on the residents' faces and know that they're enjoying this, too

Kylie said that other parents should give the playgroup a go.

"I would encourage others to get on board and support this great initiative," Kylie said.
